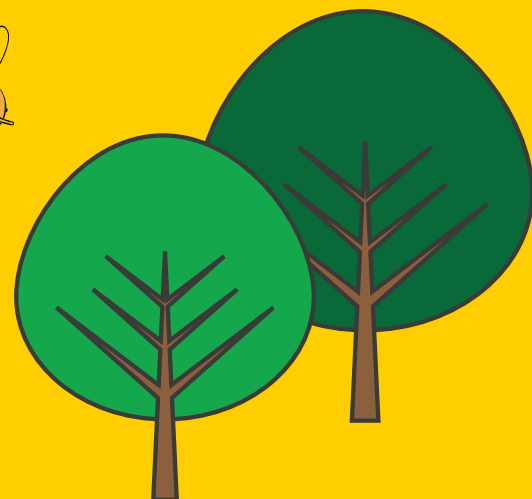

Sprite wanted to know more so he bravely asked the grown-ups to explain things and they did.

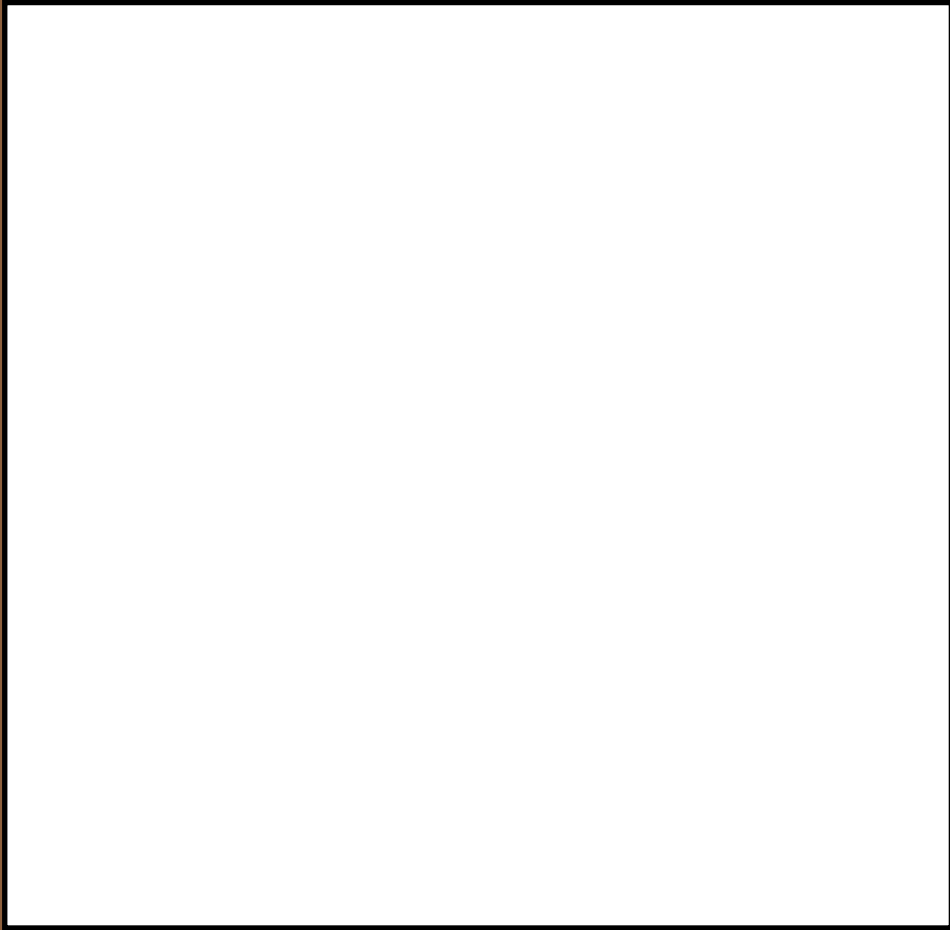
The social worker explained that Sprite would go and live with a foster family, because he couldn't stay with his own parents at the moment.



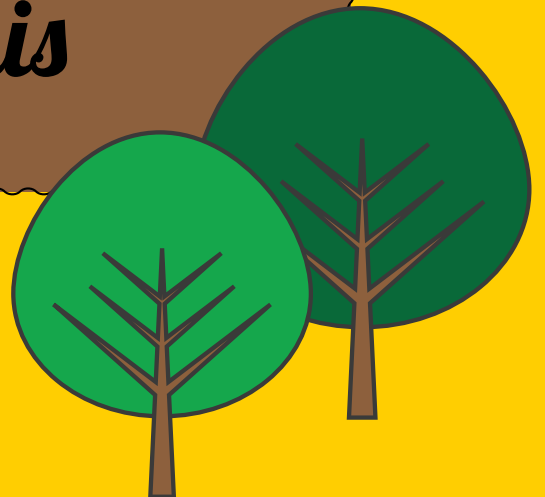
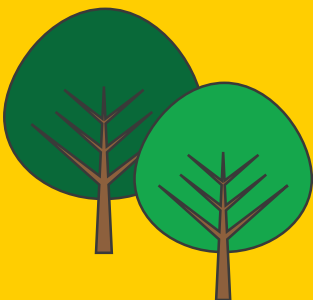


This was a bit scary as Sprite didn't know what a foster carer was as no one had explained this to him.

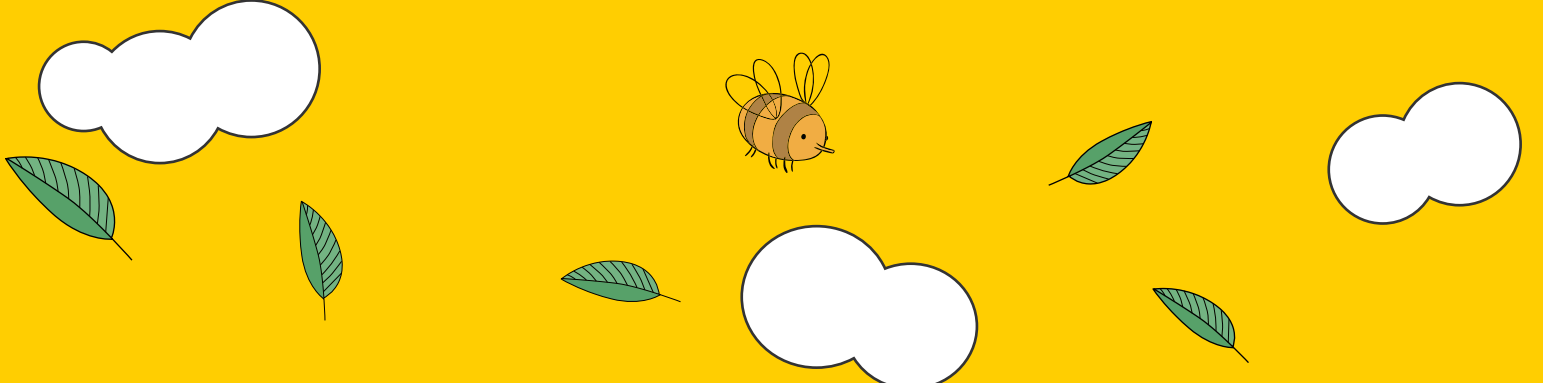
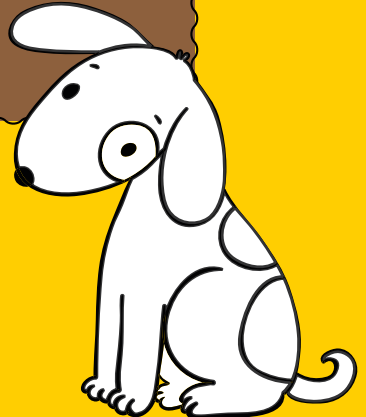

The social worker also explained that sometimes Sprite might have visits from the social workers to see how he is getting on in his new foster home.

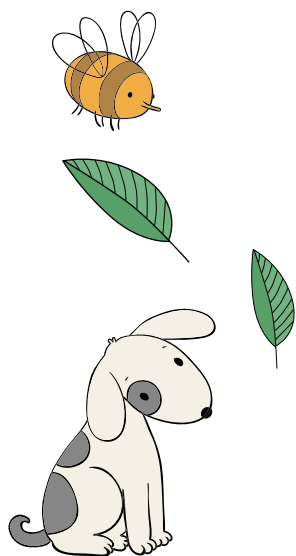
At other times, all of the people within the circle would have a meeting to discuss how Sprite was feeling and they would always ask him what his thoughts and feelings were and what he wanted to do.

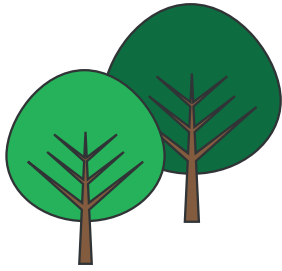

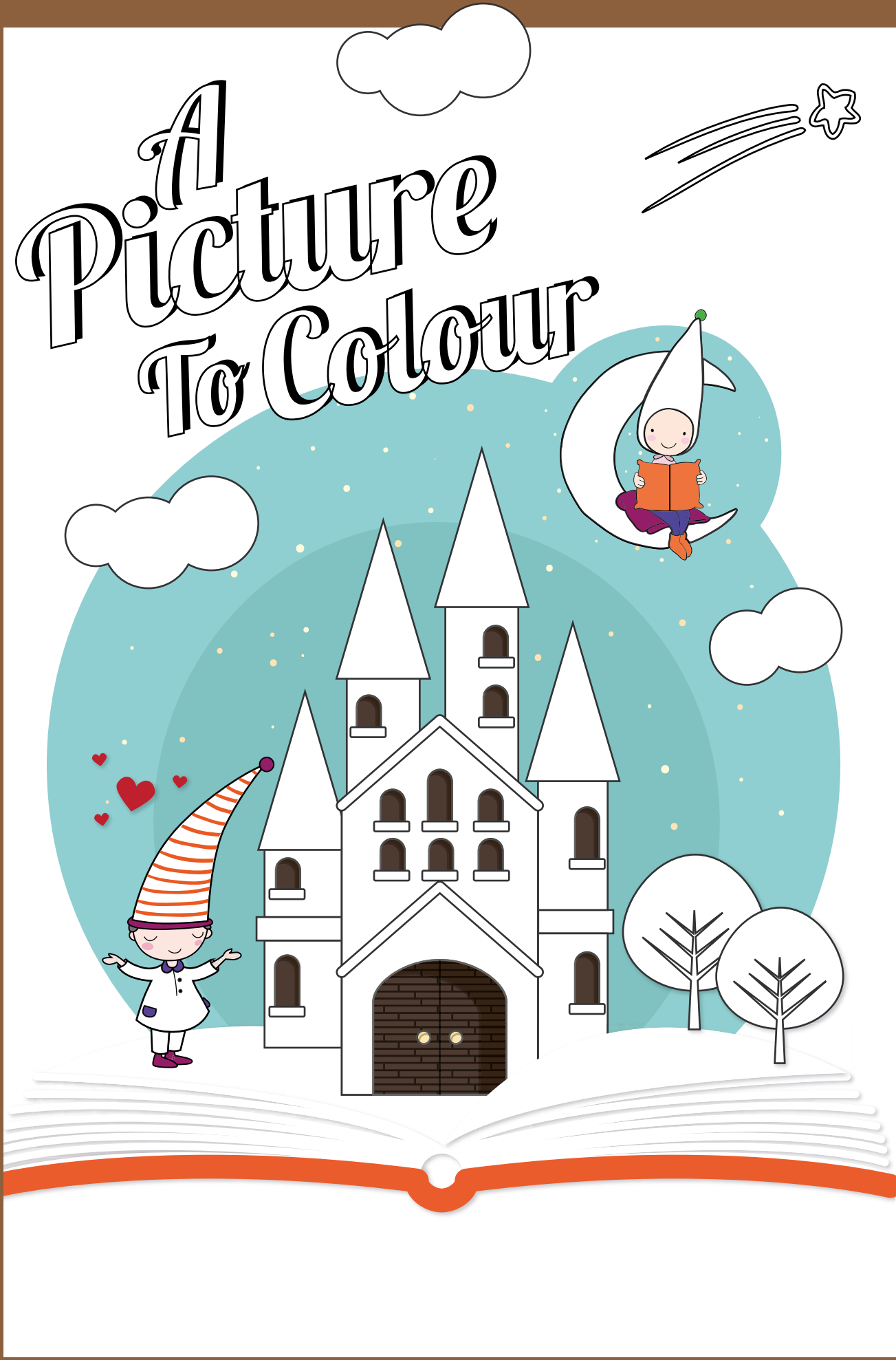

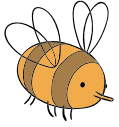

Dictionary



Agency - is another word for an organisation or company.

Care Plan - this is a document that is written to make sure you are being looked after properly by your local authority and foster carers, and that your wishes and feelings are taken into account. Your social worker will also be able to answer questions about this.

Childrens Review - this is a meeting you will have with some important people who make decisions about you and the care you need.

Contact - is when you stay in touch with someone like your family or friends.

DBS Checks (Disclosure & Barring Services) - this is where the government checks to see if an adult is OK to help and be with children. These are checks that Fosterplus will take care of.

Foster care - foster care is when a child is living with and being cared for by a family which is not their own.





Dictionary

Foster Carers - are people who look after you in their home with their families. They will provide you with help, food, shelter and care.

Foster Home - this is where foster children live with their foster family.

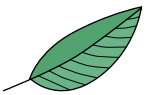
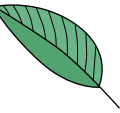
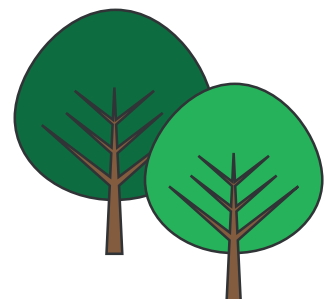
Helpline - is a number or a place you can call to talk to someone that will help you.

Independent Reviewing Officer - the person who checks that children are listened to as well as those of their family, carers, social workers and others.

Local Authorities - a part of the government that will help you with decisions and other important things.

Ofsted - is an organisation run by the government that does regular checks of schools, child day care and foster care agencies in England to make sure everyone is doing what they should do.

Social Worker - a social worker is a person who helps people who cannot help themselves.

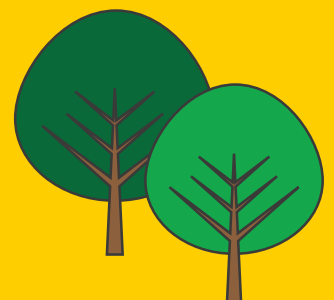

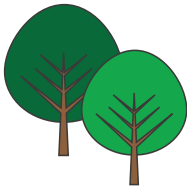
